#### **MEMBER SPOTLIGHT**




**Don Siebern** has been a member of Chapter 403 for six years. He was born near Cincinnati, Ohio and when he was 16 the family moved to a farm in Sabina where he lived for three years before joining the Army Air Corps in 1942. He went to power turret school for the P-61 but ended up in a night fighter squadron. He applied to Aviation Cadet Training to be a pilot, navigator or bombardier In 1943 and attended college in Selinsgrove, Pennsylvania where he received his first 10 hours of dual flying in a J3 Cub. He was sent back to the Classification Center in Nashville for three months before finishing his preflight in Mississippi, and then went to Ocala, Florida for primary training. While flying with the chief flight instructor he found out they were cutting back so Don ended up in gunnery school and was assigned to a B-24 crew.

After three years and three months he was discharged and went to Ohio State University in Columbus on the GI Bill majoring in agriculture. Don joined the Naval Reserve while attending Ohio State but didn't go to monthly meetings. After he graduated in 1950 he moved to Idaho, only to be called to active duty and spending two years in Jacksonville, Florida assembling mockups at an Ordinance Training School. When Don got out of the Navy he returned to farming in Goshen, Ohio, got married and eventually turned the farm into a golf course which he sold in 1974. They moved to Colorado in 1975 for the climate and skiing and divorced in 1977. Don lived in Frisco for 12 years working in a ski shop and construction, he lived in Steamboat Springs for 13 years working at Ramada and Walmart..

Don learned to fly in the J3-Cub and then a Stearman, and got his certificate in 1947 before going into the Navy. Over the years he has belonged to flying clubs and has flown an Apache, Bonanza, Cessna 182 and Piper Cherokee. While living in Steamboat Springs Don started building a Polliwagen which was one of the first fiberglass homebuilt airplanes. It was two place with retractable gear and a VW engine. He had finished shaping two pieces of the fuselage when the designer went bankrupt and Don ended up throwing it into a dumpster in 1979.

In 2000 Don moved to Nevada to get out of tax happy Colorado and he lives in Topaz Ranch Estates. He has worked the graveyard shift at Walmart for six years, and if you shop early in the morning you might run into him as he pushes the huge floor polisher up and down the aisles.

Spike Duncan was advised by "outsiders" not to fly his pristine Velocity into Fallon because of the poor runway surface (pushers are more sensitive to "gravel" runways) but even ended up giving a couple of youngsters a second flight because they wanted to fly in the "spaceship". Mike Jimenez was ready to fly home when a late arrival asked for a ride. "Aw, sure" was his response for the umpteenth time this month. That's what we're talking about!

Organized by Gary Hall, Mike Reynolds and Merry Romine, the joint EAA Chapter 403 and Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Indian Tribe activity brought the Young Eagles program to a community not otherwise able to experience aviation the way we do. A generous contribution by the tribal council helped defray the cost of avgas while breakfast and lunch were also provided to the participants. All Young Eagles were presented with framed certificates and pictures of them with the aircraft and pilot while a local newspaper reporter chronicled the unique event.

Bob and Audrey Stroub handled dispatch and registration while Mike, Merry, Bob Dickinson, Tommy Dee and Chris Romine provided ground support and certificate generation.

David McClelland and Joe Raphael canceled other commitments to fly their beautiful RV-6A's, complete with a crowd-pleasing, high-speed, low-altitude fly-by (I mean, go-around, Mr. FAA).
